There are only 40 parking spaces at the Conference Centre. You are kindly requested not to park in the adjacent residential streets. You can park in any of the many car parks on the Main University Campus, they are marked P on the map of the University. The Main Campus is only a short walk from the Conference Centre, the quickest route is marked with heavy arrows on the same map. You do not require a parking permit.

LOCAL TRANSPORTATION

Glen Eyre is only a short walk (5 - 10 minutes) from the Conference Centre, and we are assuming most people will choose to walk (the route is shown on the map on page 7). We are assuming that most people will choose not to walk from the Hilton, but for the intrepid the route is shown on the map on page 6. In addition, from the Hilton Hotel, Solent Blue Line buses, numbers 47 and 45, depart from Chilworth roundabout approximately every 15 minutes and stop close to the Conference Centre.

Smoking: In the interest of health and safety, the University has adopted a policy of "no smoking" throughout all University buildings. Visitors are requested to comply with this policy.

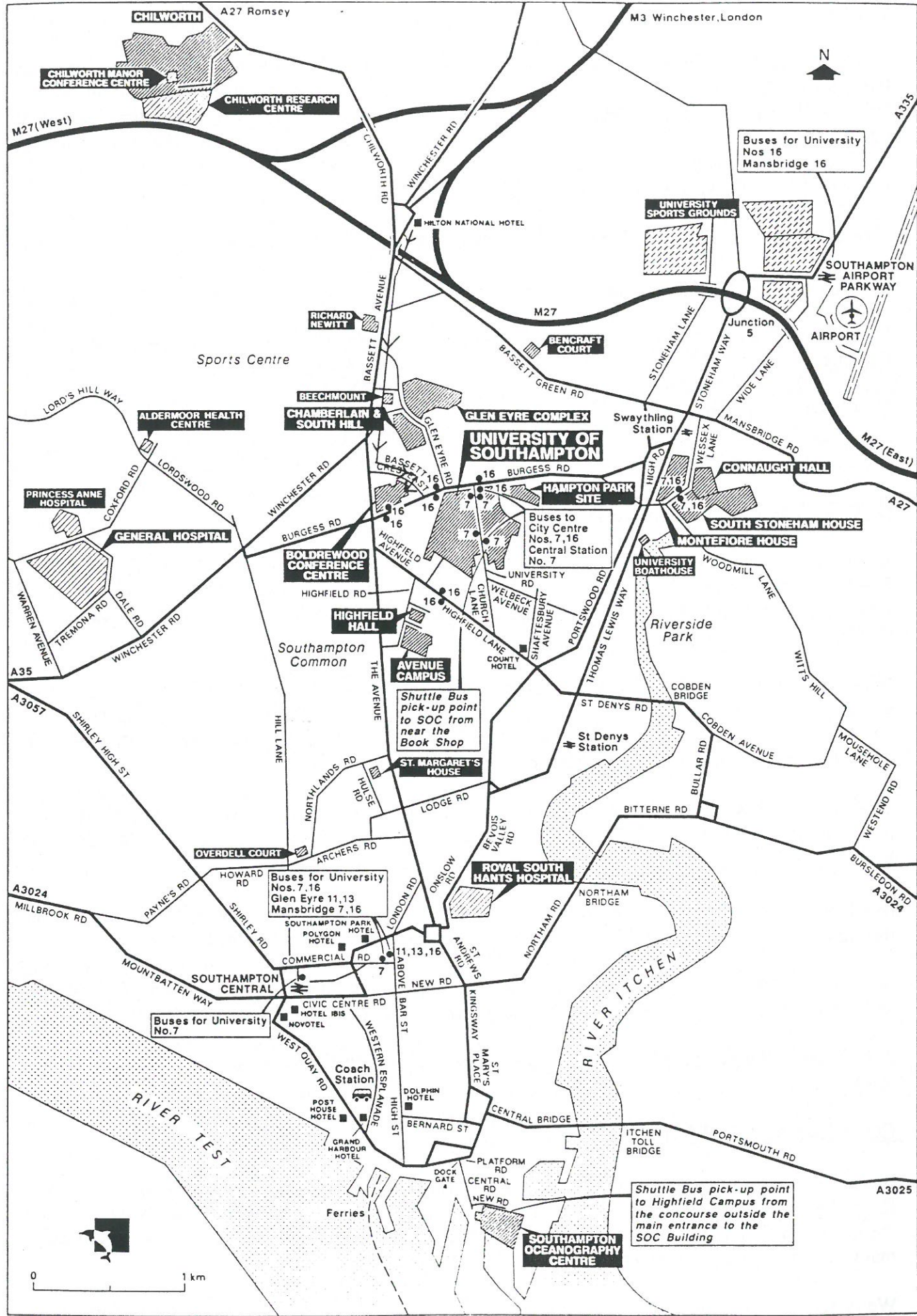
Sports and other Facilities: You are invited to use the squash courts at Glen Eyre Hall of residence, but you must bring your own equipment. There is also a TV room and launderette.

Telephones: There are coin-box and card telephones in Glen Eyre Hall of Residence and the Boldrewood Conference Centre.

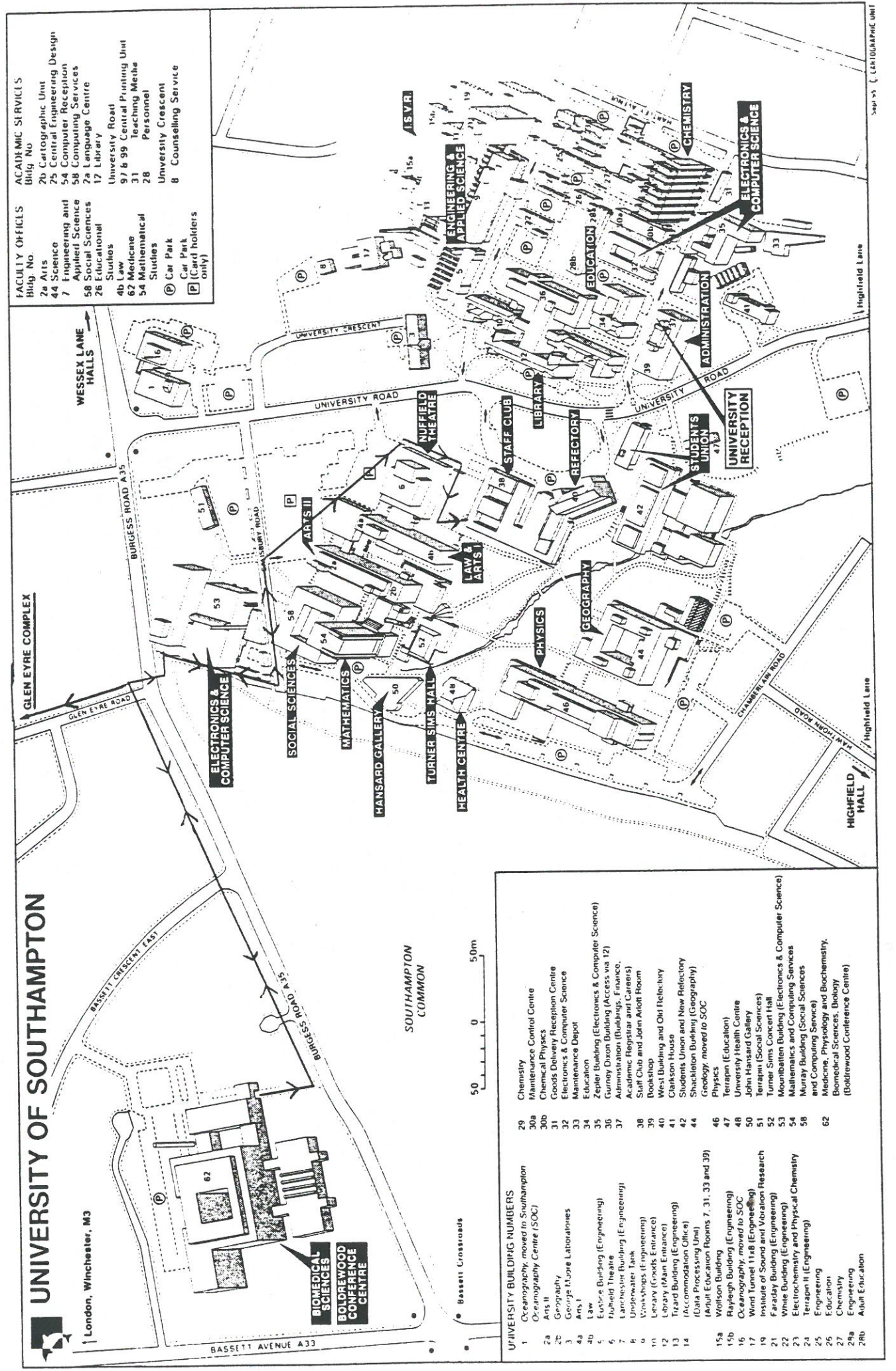
