ORGANISATION OF THE CONFERENCE

The Conference proceedings -- all panels, lectures, committee meetings and on-site accommodation -- are centred around a cluster of buildings no more than four minutes' walk from each other (see map).

The main Conference proceedings will take place in the **Renold Building**. The Plenary Address by Professor Robert Cox will be in the **Renold Building**.

The Conference Office, Publishers' Exhibition, and Paper Sales Room are all located in the **Renold Building**.

The restaurant is in the **Barnes Wallis Dining Room**. The Bar is in the **Harwood Room, Barnes Wallis Building**.

Newsagents, shops, bookshops, bus services and banks are equally concentrated and centralised in or adjacent to these buildings.

PUBLISHERS' EXHIBITION

The Publishers' Exhibition is located on the Main Floor (Level C) of the **Renold Building**. The Paper Sales Room is also on the Main Floor.

TRAVEL INFORMATION

RAIL

There are frequent rail services to most parts of the country from Manchester Picadilly station.

The station is ten minutes' walk from the Conference Centre. A taxi should cost around £2.00.

AIR

Manchester Airport is linked with 175 worldwide destinations by 95 airlines. It is 10 miles (16 km) south of the City centre.

There is a direct rail link to the airport from Piccadilly Station (six trains per hour, with a limited overnight service). Travelling time is approximately 20 minutes and the one-way fare is £2.15.

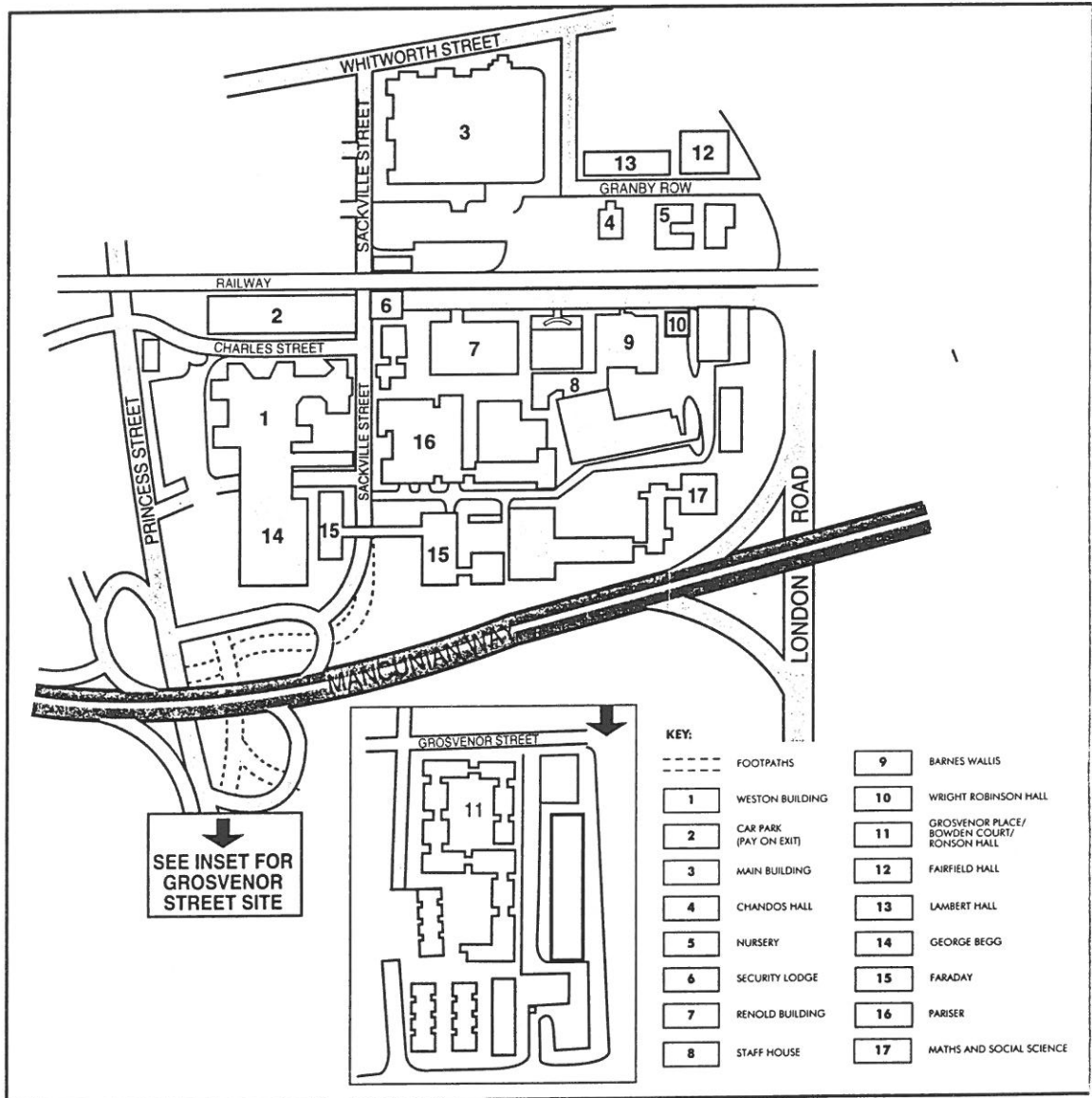

ROUTE INFORMATION

TO MANCHESTER FROM

THE NORTH VIA M6 M61. Follow STRETFORD signs into M60. Leave at Exit 12 and join M602 SALFORD. At end of Motorway, follow A57 MANCHESTER sign (Regent Road) for approx. 1 mile. Proceed under railway bridge, continuing into A57M (Mancunian Way). Continue on A57M, take 2nd exit signed UMIST. Immediately fork right on slip road into Sackville St., following UMIST sign. The car park is the 1st turn on left.

YORKSHIRE VIA M62/M60. Leave at Exit 17 SALFORD and follow A56 towards Manchester for 4 miles (Bury New Road, becoming Gr. Duire St.). Enter city under railway bridge (Victoria St.) and keep straight ahead, still on A56, into Deansgate. In 1/2 mile, after passing Kendals store, left at traffic lights (TOWN HALL sign) into John Dalton St. and straight ahead at next lights into Princess St. In 1/2 mile pass under railway bridge and immediately turn left at lights into Charles St. for UMIST Car Park.

DERBYSHIRE VIA A6. Follow A6 signs towards Manchester City Centre until reaching the flyover junction with A57M. Continue on A6 and in 200 yards pass under railway bridge and turn left at traffic lights into Fairfield St. Pass UMIST Main Building on left in 200 yards. Turn left at next lights into Sackville St. Pass under railway bridge and turn right into Charles St. for UMIST Car Park entrance.

THE POTTERIES VIA A34. Follow signs for Manchester through Congleton and Wilmslow, 4 miles north of which the A34 becomes a dual-carriageway. Pass over M60 and in 3 miles, at roundabout, take 2nd exit, following LONGSIGHT signs. (Ignore the A34 for the City Centre, which takes the 1st exit and passes under the railway.) In 1 mile, merge with A6 and follow this road towards the City Centre as for DERBYSHIRE.

THE SOUTH & MIDLANDS VIA M6. Leave at Exit 19 and follow A556 MANCHESTER for 4 miles. Join M56 MANCHESTER at roundabout and follow to end as for NORTH WALES & CHESTER.

NORTH WALES & CHESTER VIA M56. Follow MANCHESTER signs to end of M56 Motorway and keep straight ahead into A5103 MANCHESTER for 4 miles. On reaching roundabout beneath overhead road take 3rd exit, following A57M SHEFFIELD signs to next roundabout; then 2nd exit, up ramp to join A57M. Keep to near side lane for 200 yards and leave at next exit signed UMIST. Immediately fork right on slip road, following UMIST sign. The multi-storey car park is now in sight and is entered from 1st turn on left.

MERSEYSIDE VIA M62. Leave at Exit 12 and join M602 MANCHESTER. At end of this MOTORWAY follow A57 MANCHESTER as for THE NORTH.

TRAVEL TO THE MANCHESTER CONFERENCE CENTRE

RAIL

PICCADILLY STATION

Outside the station main entrance, turn right and go down the steps to Store St. Turn left, cross over the dual carriageway into Whitworth St. UMIST is 300 yards on the left.

OXFORD ROAD STATION

At the bottom of the station approach cross over Oxford St. into Whitworth St. UMIST Main Building is on the right at 2nd traffic lights, in 600 yards.

VICTORIA STATION

Take the Metrolink Tram to Piccadilly Station and follow directions as for Piccadilly.

BUS & COACH

PICCADILLY BUS STATION

Leave at Portland St. end (nearest to loading stand YA). Cross over into Aytoun St.; walk down this street, and UMIST is across the road beyond the traffic lights.

CHORLTON STREET BUS STATION

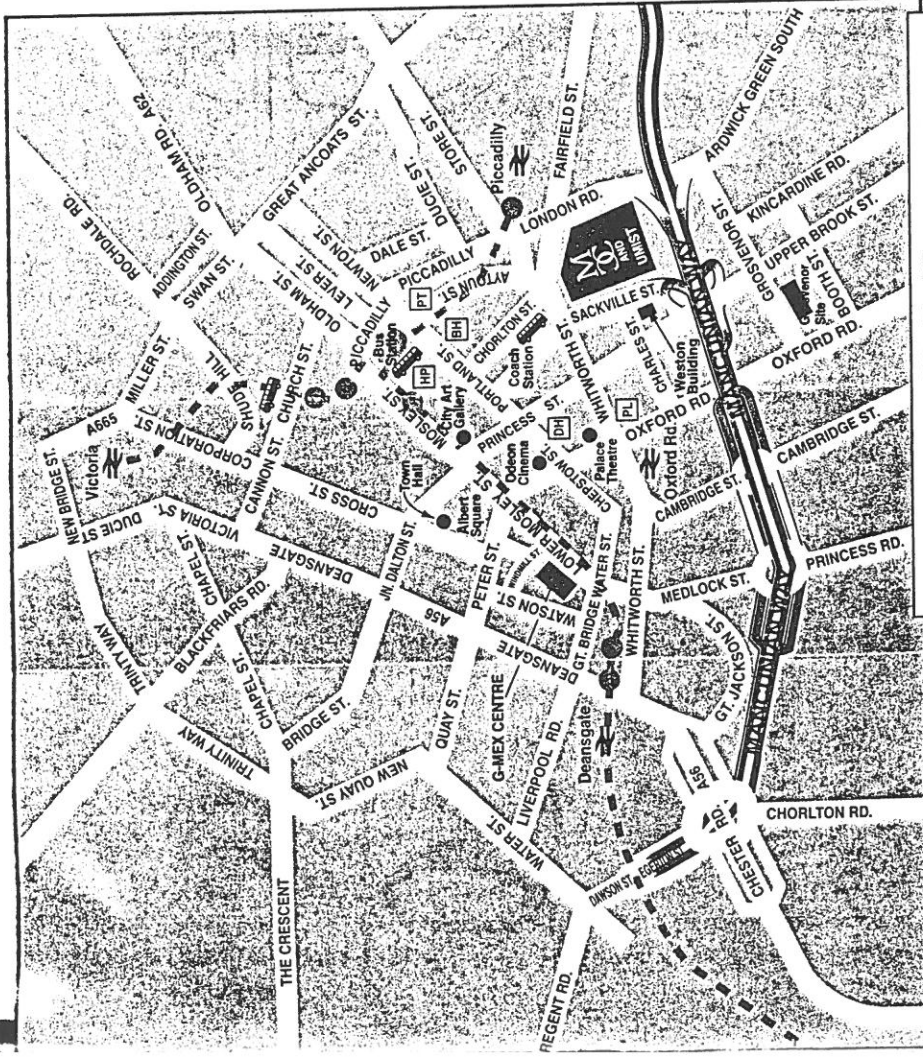
